

Back in Ben Franklin's day, Postal Inspectors, then called "surveyors," were assigned to regulate the few existing post offices and to make sure that local postmasters were held accountable for safe delivery of the mail. While that is still part of the job, protecting the U.S. Mail today has become much more sophisticated.


The Postal Service reaches a domestic and a global audience — constantly upgrading technology and information and hiring and training motivated individuals to keep pace with these fast-changing times. Today's Postal Inspectors are problem-solving and investigative federal officers who carry firearms, make arrests, and serve federal search warrants and subpoenas. They work closely with U.S. Attorneys and federal and local law enforcement agencies to investigate a broad scope of cases and prepare them for prosecution, relating to:

- Theft of mail.



TALENTED INDIVIDUALS, DEDICATED TEAMWORK

In a single year, U.S. Postal Inspectors arrested almost 11,000 criminal suspects and secured over 9,600 convictions. And that took real teamwork: Postal Inspectors working together; cooperating with other law enforcement agencies; and supported by the knowledge and expertise of over 900 professional and technical employees.

The Postal Inspection Service has 18 field divisions and multiple domiciles, plus an information technology infrastructure which supports over

4,500 users at more than 220 sites nationwide. In addition, the Forensic & Technical Services Division, located in Dulles, VA, is one of the most comprehensive, leading-edge forensics facilities in the nation. It is so respected that many law enforcement agencies around the country contact the division for assistance.




TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

U.S. Postal Inspectors are among the best-trained law enforcement officers in the country. The training facility is located in the William F. Bolger Center for Leadership Development in Potomac, MD. It combines a beautiful campus with advanced features of an elite training program, including an on-site dormitory, dining, classroom, fitness, and firearms facilities. All Postal Inspectors engage in 14 weeks of scenario-based basic training covering investigative techniques, defensive tactics, firearms, legal matters, search and seizure, arrest techniques, court procedures, postal operations, and a detailed study of federal laws under Postal Inspection Service jurisdiction. The training program focuses on building problem-solving abilities, critical thinking, and cognitive skills.

Throughout your career as a Postal Inspector, you will be offered opportunities for continuing education and training. Refresher courses and specialized courses help you develop new skills and provide support and training in your specific expertise. You can also take advantage of technical and intercultural courses and physical fitness training at various domiciles around the country.

GENERAL ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

U.S. Postal Inspectors are part of an elite corps that significantly impacts virtually every business, organization, home, and individual in America. In order to measure up to this trust, it is imperative that we demand the highest standards of our applicants. Opportunities for entry-level Postal Inspector positions are competitive and are filled based on a variety of basic and specialized criteria.

BASIC REQUIREMENTS

To qualify for training as a U.S. Postal Inspector, candidates must be U.S. citizens between the ages of 21 and 36, and must have the following:

- A conferred, four-year degree from an accredited college or university.
- A valid state driver's license, held for at least two years.
- No felony convictions or misdemeanor domestic violence convictions.
- The ability to write and speak English clearly.

Throughout the selection process, candidates are evaluated on the following characteristics: written and oral communication, following instructions, interpreting information, decision making, extracting details, setting priorities, and dealing with people. Applicants' abilities are assessed by a panel of trained, senior Postal Inspectors. Applicants must also pass a written exam, medical and polygraph examinations, and a drug screening before being considered for employment.





WHEN DISASTER STRIKES, INSPECTORS SECURE AND PROTECT THE MAIL

MEDICAL REQUIREMENTS

All applicants must be in good physical condition (weight proportional to height) and good mental condition. Vision requirements: 20/100 in each eye without glasses (Snellen), corrected to at least 20/30 in one eye and 20/40 in the other eye, with good color perception. Individuals who have undergone radial keratotomy (RK) are considered unsuitable for the position of Postal Inspector. Hearing requirements: ability to hear ordinary conversations from 15 feet, without a hearing aid.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS

Beyond the basic and medical requirements, all candidates must have a background in at least one of these specialized areas:

FOREIGN LANGUAGE EXPERTISE:

Candidates with advanced competency in a foreign language must pass a formal oral proficiency test administered by a contractor of the U.S. Postal Inspection Service.

INTERNAL

AUDIT EXPERTISE:

Candidates must be currently certified as a Certified Public Accountant, Certified Management Accountant, Certified Internal Auditor, or Certified Information Systems Auditor, or have two years experience conducting internal audits in the public or private sector. If claiming certification, the applicant must provide proof of certification.

JURIS DOCTORATE:

Candidates must have a J.D. degree and be currently licensed and admitted to a State Bar.

LAW ENFORCEMENT EXPERTISE:

Candidates must have at least two years successful

performance in law enforcement with statutory arrest authority and authority to conduct criminal investigations.

MILITARY OFFICERS:

Candidates must be active-duty and former commissioned military officers who apply within two years from their date of separation, having served at least two years continuous active duty and received an honorable discharge.

POSTAL SERVICE EXPERIENCE:

Candidates from the Postal Service, with unique knowledge and skills of value to the Postal Inspection Service, must have at least two years performance in one of the following three areas:

- **Supervisors** (including *acting supervisors*).
A letter from the applicant's immediate supervisor must verify that the applicant has been a supervisor for a minimum of two years.

- **Inspection Service employees** (including long-term contractors and employees on extended details in the Inspection Service). These will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis, if application is accompanied by a recommendation letter from the division Postal Inspector in Charge.
- **Employees with specialized postal experience**, such as injury compensation or postal technology. These will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis, if application is accompanied by a recommendation letter from the division Postal Inspector in Charge.
